UPCOMING EXCURSION: NARRYNA HOUSE

THRA has teamed up with **Narryna house museum** in Battery Point to offer an excursion for members on **Saturday 26 April**. The excursion will include morning tea and an introductory talk about the history of Narryna and its collection followed by a self-guided tour of the house, its collections and garden.

Narryna is an 1830s merchant's house and collection that tells the story of early colonial life in Hobart. The fine Georgian town house was built by seafarer, Captain Andrew Haig who built warehouses facing Salamanca Place in 1834. Narryna has had a varied existence as a home to large families, boarding house, hospital and museum. In 1955 it became Australia's first folk museum through the efforts of Hobart residents who formed a collection that is redolent of the mercantile and maritime histories of Salamanca Place and Battery Point.
