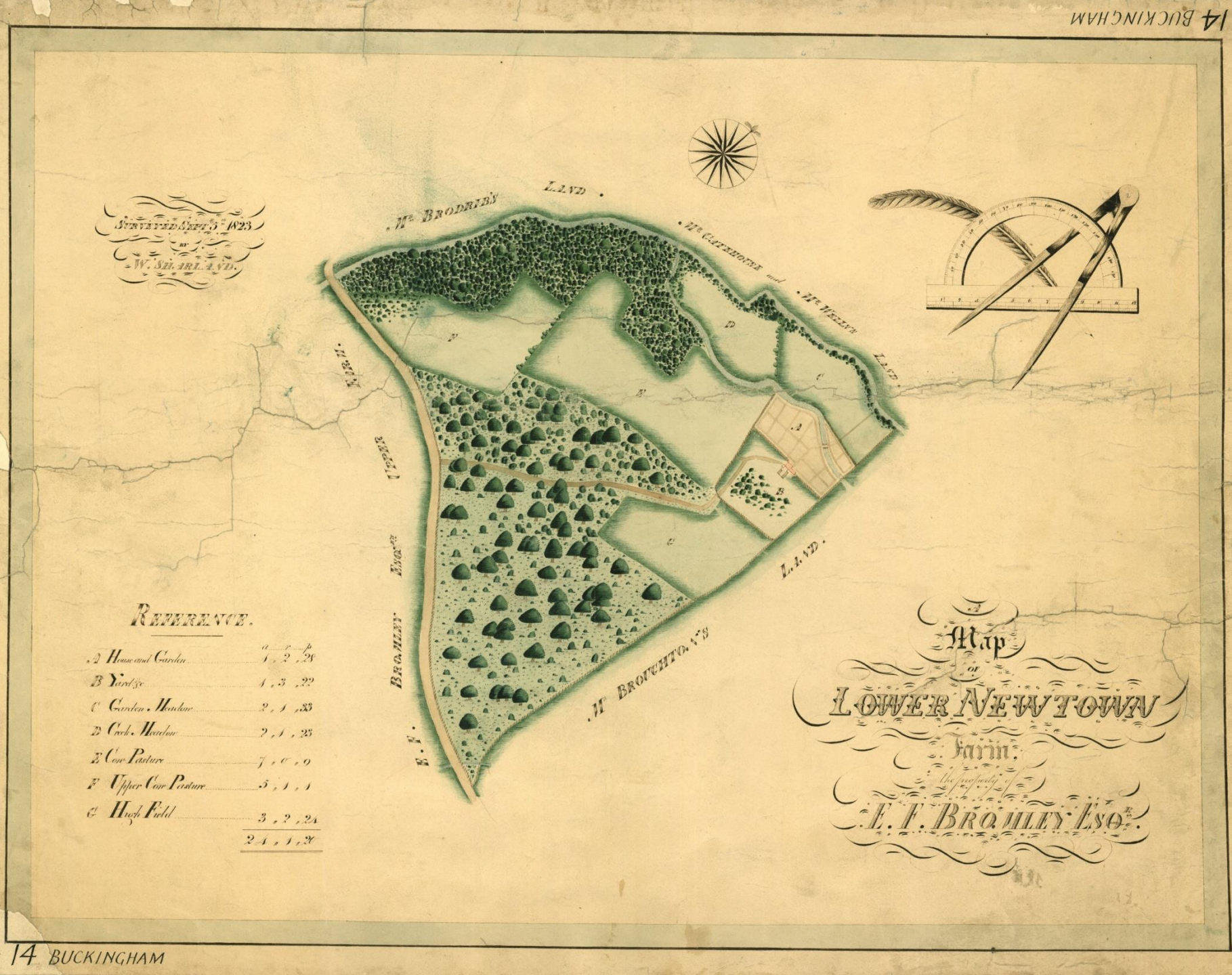


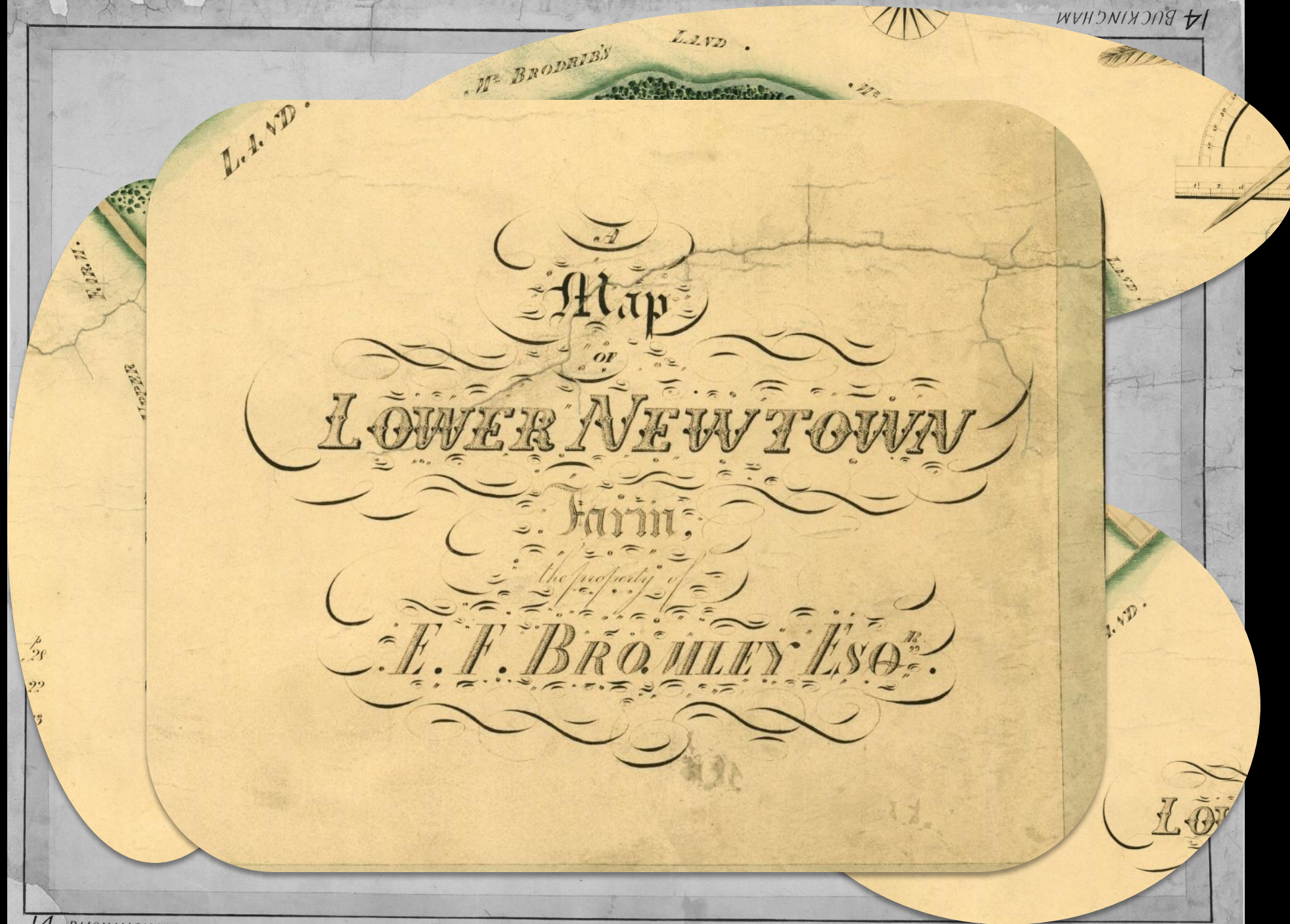

The Estate on the said side of the Road, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ Miles from Town, and called Mitchell's Farm.

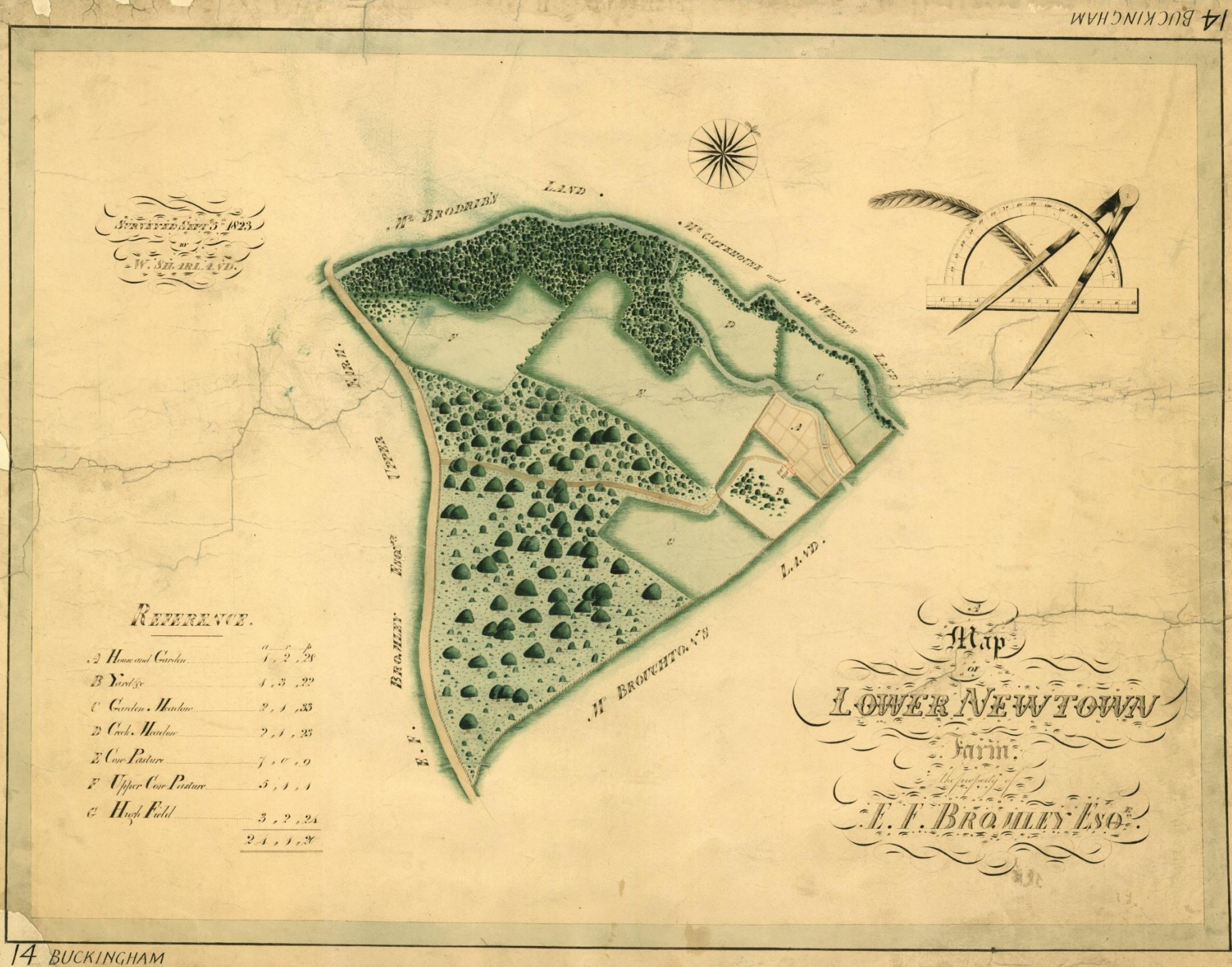
The Estate adjoining Mitchell's Farm, known by the Name of Sponsford's Farm.
