




















War Savings Stamps can be bought at any Post Office.



and with fillets of wallaby or kangaroo skin, worn sometimes under the knee, sometimes around the wrist or ankle; the men. especially when young, were also careful of their personal appearance—a fully dressed young man wore a necklace of spiral shells, and a number of kangaroos' teeth fastened in his woolly hair.)

They paid great attention to their hair; it was cut a lock at a time with the aid of two stones, one placed underneath as a chopping-block, the other used as a chopper. A sort of pomatum made of fat and ochre was used as a dressing. Tattooing was not practised, but a more barbarous kind of decoration, produced by gashing the arm so as to give rise to cicatrices, was not uncommon.

The Tasmanians had no houses, nor any fixed abode; they







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
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
