Whaleboats under sail (1888)



They were farmshed with what they wanted besides books & many things for the children, when they took their leave. When about half way to those or a mile from land a violent squall came on which, before the Sail could be put down, upset the boat & they wow all therown into the water. The old man & the infant were drowned. The women Surended in pashing the three cheldren, who could swine, before them thro' the surf safely to shore. The same squall dashed the ship "Rebecca" on The rocks & the buome a week. The both with his brother & a female paperyor & all the Crew Geeft three sailors who would not leave the Ships I were drowned) got to land in the long boat, I were for 3 water hispitably busted by the women in their hut. The bapt there took his long boot with Susan the Jemale paperger, Tom Set & Bill the Man mentioned at the end of the journal. They Succeeded in reaching Port Phillip & landed at the Heads The first person they sow was Me Forwack who was then Police Majestrate at gelong, he took Tome in charge, also hired dusan the Jenale who was a ruspectable looking woman from Gulloway) for his

distir. The bapt then proceeded up the Bay to the Melbourne, but an advertesement in the paper to Day those were two goels on kings bland, that he would bring when he returned if any fearnale would agree to take charge of them. We answered the advertisement officing to take them. 

AUSTRALIA'S WORST SHIPWRECK



FOREWORD BY PATSY ADAM-SMITH



WRECES ON KING'S ISLAND .- The steamer Manchester chartered by Government to proceed with H.M.S. Electra, to King's I-land, to render assistance to the survivors of the Waraiah and Brahmin, wrecked on that island, returned yesterday, bringing up the Lascars and passengers. The Manchester, after casting off the Flectra at the Heads, has not since seen her, and from the difficulty and danger which would be incurred in removing the specie from the heavy surf prevailing on the island, deemed it advisable to leave eight hands in charge of the treasure notil further orders from Government. She brings intelligence of another vessel having been wrecked on the Island some time ago, with female emigrants, and that L 100,000 in specie, secured from that wreck, has been recovered, and is added to the 1..25,000 in charge of the seamen left by the Manchester. An old black woman named Maria, one of the wallabee hunters, who has come up by the steamer, states that the L.100.000 had been carefully guarded for a period of five months by the survivors of the wrecked female emigrant ship, but that death had swept away every trace of this disaster. The woman is the widow of the man Scott, who resided so many years on the Island, and who lost his life wrecking some years since. She is also the mother of the boy Scott, who was in the service of the late Governor's Secretary when lost off Western Port.

WRECKS ON KING'S ISLAND. — The steamer Manchester, chartered by Government to proceed with Her Majesty's steamer Electra to King's Island, to render assistance to the survivors of the Waterwitch and Brahmin, wrecked on that island, returned yesterday, bringing up the Lascars and passengers. The Manchester, after casting off the Electra at the Heads, has not since seen her, and from the difficulty and danger which would be incurred in removing the specie from the heavy surf prevailing on the island, deemed it advisable to leave eight hands in charge of the treasure until further orders from Government. She brings intelligence of another vessel having been wrecked on the island sometime ago, with female emigrants, and that £100,000 in specie, secured from that wreck, has been recovered, and is added to the £25,000 in charge of the seamen left by the *Manchester*. An old black woman named Maria, one of the wallabee hunters, who has come by the steamer, states that the £100,000 had been carefully guarded for a period of five months by the survivors of the wrecked female emigrant ship, but that death had swept away every trace of this disaster. The woman is the widow of the man Scott, who resided so many years on the island, and who lost his life wrecking some years since. She is also the mother of the boy Scott, who was in the service of the late Governor's Secretary when lost off Western Port.

Madagascar sailed from Melbourne for London on 12 August 1853 with 150 passengers and crew and 2 tonnes of gold, but failed to arrive.
